Ask a Gardener

My "sweetie" has just given me a beautiful orchid for Valentine's Day. It has numerous blooms. How do I care for it so it will continue to thrive and bloom?

CFGC Members Rahel Haley and Sandra Kittenger have had good luck with maintaining orchids. They have simple advice which they would like to say is not expert but rather what has been successful for them. See below for part one of how to care for orchids. Check back in March for the remainder of their advice.

Light: It is important that orchids receive a lot of light, but no direct sunlight for a prolonged time. Placing them in an eastern window is ideal, however if you do not have it and southern window works as long as the light is defused. My orchids are in a southern window behind a sheer curtain, and do receive about 30 min - 2 hour of indirect sunlight every day. I also place them my southern facing kitchen window where the arbor outside my window provides some shade. They need some sunshine, however the amount is the key to not burning them or dry them up. In the summertime or as soon as you are ready to turn on the AC it is a good idea to move them outside in a protected area. The cold dry air of the AC will kill them faster than anything else you can do to them. I have mine sit on the north facing front porch that receives maybe 1 hour of direct sun in the evenings.

Watering: Whenever watering them regardless if they are in bark or moss it is best to take them to your kitchen sink and shower them with lukewarm water, let the water run through the pot for 2-5 min and shower all the leaves, let them drip dry and put them back in their spot. This sometimes can be a challenge when they are in bark, as these pieces want to wash out and down your drain. Some people mist them daily rather than watering them and let them sit on a tray of wet pebbles, this process has never worked for me because I forget to keep the pebbles wet or to mist them daily. Since I keep mine in moss, I test the moss moisture by sticking my finger into the pot about 1/2 inch deep. If they are still moist I skip watering them. Whenever they are in bark I water them about every other week or when I remember it. Once a quarter I give them orchid food by soaking them for about 5 min in a tub of diluted food (better too weak food than too strong or you will burn the roots) and then drain them well before I place them back in their spot. The key is not to overwater your orchids, they will forgive you for drying them out some, but not if you overwater them, they will die. If you are in doubt when to feed them, look at the leaves... if they are more yellowish green than the deep dark green color they had when you bought them, they need food. Better starve them of food than give them too much so if you skip several months, do it when you remember.

- FYI: The official population estimate for Monarch butterflies is 146 million, compared to a long-term average of 300 million and a peak of 1 billion. The clustering butterflies cover 2.91 hectares of forest compared to a peak of 18 hectares in 1996 and an average of 6 hectares. A population of 6 hectares is the target for monarch recovery. The count is down this year by about 27%. The late 2016 winter March storm in Mexico resulted in significant causalities last year as the butterflies were beginning to migrate north. Hence there was a smaller population in the spring/summer of 2016. This official Monarch Butterfly count was released February 9, 2017. Source: NC Birds and Butterflies February newsletter.

Every plant and hardscape should work for you not the other way around. Expand your mulch bed lines to give the plants room and this will create a better balance and rhythm along with the turf lines. Turf grass is a specialty plant that needs to be babied here in our area. Wait until late February to prune

your ornamental grasses so you can enjoy all the color and texture they add to your yard. Pathways can take you to a delightful spot if you have dead space to cultivate. Remember crepe myrtles have 4 seasons of beauty. Avoid pruning them to look like mop heads. And, most of all from the poet Rumi "Don't think the garden loses its ecstasy in winter.
