Ask a Gardener

Help! How do I care for my beautiful orchid so it continues to bloom? Part two from CFGC Members Rahel Haley and Sandra Kittenger who have had good luck with maintaining orchids. They have simple advice which they would like to say is not expert but rather what has been successful for them.

Temperature: Orchids do best indoors during the winter and spring. I

move them outside after we have sustained 60+ degrees. Because the air indoors is dryer it is key to have them experience the humidity they require on a regular basis. Never allow the air conditioner vent to blow on them; however having the heater vent nearby is ok as long as they remain moist. In the summertime when you have them outside make sure that you continue with the consistent watering care. When the temperatures get cooler than 55 at night you need to bring them back inside. Since they have been outside all summer make sure you soak them thoroughly outside to get rid of the ants and any other insect that has lived in your pot before you bring them inside. Not a fun experience if you forget this step. Soil: Most orchids come in a bark mixture and this is ok, however I find it hard to regulate their moisture level, so as soon as they are done blooming I move them into a moss environment. Remember these plants are used to growing in very humid air with no dirt around them and they receive all their nutrition from air and rain. So the simpler their mixture is the better. Long-term maintenance: If orchids thrive, they bloom for 4-7 months and are dormant for 2-5 months before producing blooms again. Some species take even longer to bloom and that is ok. The main thing is that they will always rebloom; you just need to remain consistent with taking care of them. I have had some orchids be dormant for 12-18 months, which is ok. Once an orchid has bloomed, leave it alone; do not cut off the flowering stem. This stem will regrow new blooms time after time... and if it is done using the stem, it will let you know as it will produce a new stem and the old stem will dry completely out and look like a reed at which time you can cut it off. Whenever a new stem appears, it is easy to confuse with the roots, as they look the same initially. Also during the dormant time the plant will sprout additional roots that insist on growing outside the pot, this is natural as this is what they do in nature. Do not feel the need to repot it, the more air the roots have the happier your orchid is. And if your orchid does not rebloom use it as an experiment by rooting it outside in the crook of some branches in a tree, you would be surprise that they can grow in NC, and they do not spread because the temperatures will control their growth or kill them if it gets too cold.
