# **Chicken Curry Spread**





# Horticultural Minute Gardening Tips for January

Winter weather can be very interesting here in Wilmington.

Pay attention to plants/trees that are Citrus or other sub-tropical plants that are still outside if temperatures are below the 27-28 range. Many of our Citrus are beginning to set flower buds, which could be damaged. Cover with a heavy beach towel to get a couple of degrees of protection.

Larger plants/trees in containers can be laid down and covered to provide a few extra degrees of heat.

It is better not to prune anything. I know we can be tempted on warmer days to get out in our gardens and prune. Pruning will signal to the plants that it is time to grow.

When is the best time to prune roses? Anytime after February 14. At the end of January- Add a granular formulation of Super Phosphate around Crape Myrtle trees if you have noted previous blooms to be small or not many blooms. I have done this for several years and my Crape Myrtle blooms are big and lush when in season. Trees need to be looked after and nourished!

# Gardening for Wildlife

The Gardening for Wildlife Committee met on January 3<sup>rd</sup> at the home of Frances Parnell to continue planning for our upcoming workshop on May 17<sup>th</sup> at 1:30 pm at the Arboretum entitled "Options for Gardening for Wildlife."

We have confirmation from Matt Collogan, NHC Arboretum that he will speak at the workshop on the "Nature at Home" program. This program emphasizes using native plants as a way to attract wildlife.

It has been stressed by many on the committee that having the two different entities (NCWF and the NHC Arboretum) speak that we plan to emphasize how their programs "complement" each other and are not in competition with each other. To further this, interested committee members plan to meet to discuss the agenda for the workshop in the next few weeks.

#### **Edible Garden**

Black-eyed peas and collard greens are an excellent New Year's Day good luck staple in the South. The peas represent coins and the collard greens represent paper money. *The saying goes "Eat poor on New Year's Day and eat fat the rest of the year"*.

This delicious dish can be enjoyed throughout the year now as farmers' markets and grocery stores have collards and peas year-round. Recipes for collards are found around the world. Use moist heat cooking to soften the greens (slow cooker). Chop the collards into strips after removing the spine and cook the bitterness out by letting them simmer all day.
