Ladies Who Lunch



Gardening Tips for February

You will start to see Cool Season Herbs that can tolerate light frosts at local plant places by the end of the month. Cool Season Herbs include Thymes, Sages, Lavender, Marjoram, Oregano, Parsley, and Mints. Enjoy planting!

- Cut back any Grasses in the garden if you have not already done so.
- Finish trimming back any Perennials, Butterfly Bush, and Liriope BEFORE new growth appears.
- Early February is an excellent time to cut back roses growing in your landscape. Hybrid tea and grandiflora roses, in particular, should be pruned around this time every year. Otherwise, these roses tend to become leggy, less vigorous, and unattractive and do not bloom as well. Cut about ¼ inch above outward-facing buds, so new growth will grow away from, and not into, the center. Remove all dead canes, which are typically black, brown or shriveled.
- Hydrangea Pruning- be careful what you prune!!
 - Paniculata types such as the Limelights, Vanilla Strawberry, Bobo, and more, can be pruned rather hard right now. If your Hydrangeas are tree form, prune the shoots above the main trunk back to 15-18".
 - Annabelle and Inviciball can be cut as hard as to the ground. These and the Paniculatas bloom on new wood, so you will not lose blooms.
 - Mophead, Lacecap, and OakLeaf types all bloom off the old wood. The large buds you see on the top 1/3rd of the stems are the flower buds for this season. If you remove them you will have lovely foliage, but no flowers. If your plants have been in the ground for several seasons, you can remove a third of the oldest, largest-diameter stems from the ground. This will remove some buds, but it will give the plant better air circulation, reduce disease problems and keep plant(s) rejuvenated!

Hang in there....winter is almost over....I hope!!

The purpose of the workshop is to show our members the many options one has for gardening for wildlife and to promote native plants. We hope to show where these two programs complement each other.

Members of the Conservation Department had the pleasure of collaborating with Barb Cowan of the Youth Garden Clubs committee at Bradley Creek Elementary School this month. We met some adorable first graders in Mrs Joy Whitlow's class who were learning about how to keep our creeks and waterways clean.

Bonnie Mitchell, Enviornmental Educator, of the NC Coastal Federation showed slides and video of ways to prevent pollutants from going down the storm drains. The catch phrase the students learned was "Only rain down the drain". A craft session followed, further demonstrating how polluted water can be slowed and

prevented from entering the drains. We had a great time with these "Friends of the Earth" and hope to have another meeting to actually go out into the rain gardens and wetlands on the school grounds.
