

There will be arrangements both inside the house in their gallery room as well as some outdoor arrangements for the gardens.


The show is free to attend but we want to encourage members to take advantage of your visit to the show and at the same time take a tour of this historical home.



Horticultural Minute Gardening Tips for March

Prune your Hollies by end of the month. Once ALL Hollies in your garden have been pruned, it is safe to fertilize them.

Dill, Parsley, and Fennel can be planted for your enjoyment and that of the Swallowtail Butterflies that will be arriving soon.

Keep recently added plants/herbs in your garden watered. We have been very warm and dry...don't rely on your irrigation systems!! Use hose as needed.

It is safe to prune any fall-blooming Camellias and any winter bloomers that have finished blooming. Feed them at end of the month.

A few words about Trees for your garden from Marcia Doering: As redbuds are blooming all around town, there is a new cultivar on the scene: Flame Thrower. This native redbud was developed



at NC State and was awarded the 2021 Plant of the Year at the Chelsea Flower Show in London. Except in the UK, where it is named Eternal Flame! The botanical name for Flame Thrower is Cercis canadensis. It has light pink flowers followed by an ever-changing display of colorful foliage that continues into fall. New foliage emerges burgundy and yellow, displaying both colors at once for a stunning effect.

Civic Improvement

The Riverfront Task Force met to work in the CFGC Urban Garden. We met with Ron McMillan, Superintendent of Wilmington City Parks, Recreation and Forestry, David Pugh, Riverfront Park On-site Supervisor, and Shane Rivenbark, the person doing the maintenance of the gardens.

Sarah Anderson, Cathy Poulos, Mary Lou, Pia Ann Robison, Marlene Eader, Bernie Baker, and Linda Snider were present to work in the garden. We were able to discuss our garden with the city staff and made specific recommendations (plant advice was guided by Sarah Anderson) on what we would like to see:



 \cdot $\,$ some evergreen shrubs to act as a barrier on the east front edge of the garden where several utility boxes exist,

 \cdot $\;$ moving several of the existing Beauty Berries to make room for the evergreens and fill in space at the back east edge

- replacing a few dead plants
- · adding in plants to bare spaces
- · adding signage to educate the public about the native pollinator garden
- site of our proposed artwork

Dave was able to reserve parking spaces for our group, which made it very convenient. Sarah showed our group how to comb through the Muhly Grass as it had not been cut. This helped to shape it up. We will keep our eyes on weeds as the bloom season comes into play. Some species are already blooming due to the unseasonably warm weather. Mulch will go in after March 13, as the city spruces up the park for Azalea Festival. We were very pleased to meet with Shane and he is doing a great job of maintaining the space.
