#### Garden Therapy

Our Garden Therapy Committee met with the residents of Elderhaus on Monday, November 6<sup>th</sup>, for our monthly activity. Elizabeth Moore and Shital Patel planned a beautiful Thanksgiving craft with a cornucopia full of colorful fruit and leaves to honor the seasonal harvest. Eight of our 24 committee members were present to assist and enjoy time with the 41 participants. The participants loved all the

colors and were excited to be able to take their craft home. Next month (December) will be our annual craft of decorating a Christmas mug with greenery and holiday decorations.







#### **Civic Improvements**

All club members are invited to participate in 2 upcoming tree plantings:

- 1. **November 14 at 10:00 am at Smith Creek Parkway** help NH County with tree plantings at Smith Creek Parkway. Funding was done through an Azalea Garden Tour Disbursements Grant from the 2023 Tour.
- 2. **December 5 at 10 am at Long Leaf Park** Planting of 100 Long Leaf Trees (our state tree). We welcome other committees to join in to help with this Centennial project.

Civic Improvements met on October 30 at the CFGC Riverfront Garden with David Pugh, Parks Director of Cultural Events, and Shane Rivenbark, parks staff assigned to maintain the Riverfront Park. Our park sections actually looked relatively free of weeds since our last visit to weed on September 20. The Muhly Grass, Yarrow, and Abelia were blooming; Beauty bushes had lots of berries, seed heads forming on several plants, and lots of butterflies were seen. Some big additions to our garden were noted:

- 1. Trees have been planted along the Nutt St Promenade adjacent to our garden and buffering between our garden and the new high-rise apartments.
- 2. A dog station was added, and notice has been served to residents living in the apartment to please pick up after dogs and avoid letting them into the gardens (this was an issue we raised with parks staff in September, which they promptly addressed)
- 3. Discussed peeling of CFGC sign David Pugh states all signage will be replaced
- 4. Discussed educational signs somewhere in the garden to educate people on pollinator gardens. Shane is working on labeling plants throughout the garden for educational purposes.

Plans were discussed for enhancements in the garden, including moving some plants and adding new plants. Shane was very amenable to us presenting him with a design and plan for plantings. We plan to meet again on December 11 and feed ideas to Sarah Anderson, who will be our point person for the updated garden design. We recognize that the garden is a work in progress and constantly evolving from the original design that was created by the contract landscapers who originally designed it. Our committee sees the need for short and long-term design plans:

Short term: to be done in a late February planting:

Relocating and clustering existing plants

Adding in new varieties

Adding in some annuals to provide bursts of color

Long Term: next fall 2024

Planting of bulbs and preparing the garden for Centennial Spring 2025 for the installation of the signature statuary artwork and ceremony celebrating our Centennial – Horticulture & Flower Arranging have expressed interest in joining in on this!

We want to provide opportunities for more club members to get involved in the garden and will extend invitations with our scheduled activities.







#### Horticultural Minute Gardening Tips for November

#### **Trees in the Landscape Care Tips**

Winter is an ideal time to plan tree care and changes in the landscape.

- Prune while the tree is dormant so that there is less stress on the tree.
- Hire a Certified Arborist to prune.
- Do not hire anyone who will climb up a live tree using spikes.
- Pruning includes the removal of dead, diseased, or crossing limbs.
- Look for the root flare at the base of every tree in your landscape.

Expose the flare by removing mulch and, sometimes, excess soil.

Mowing in circles around a tree can push soil over the root flare, causing a build-up over time. Also, a root flare may not be evident when you purchase a new tree. Before planting, gently remove the soil in the container to expose the root flare. Then, plant the tree with the flare slightly above grade. A mulch depth of three inches is adequate for the surrounding tree ring beyond the root flare. If your tree looks like a pencil stuck in the ground, it's time to find the root flare!

Remove girdling roots. If a root is circling the tree's root area of the tree it will eventually strangle it. I remove one girdling root yearly so the tree can adjust to the water loss during the dormant season. It will begin to generate new roots over the winter with occasional watering.

Pine Tree Removal. Winter is the only time a pine tree should be removed. During the growing season, the smell of resin from cutting pine wood attracts the IPS beetle to the area. A neighbor may not want to lose a pine tree from damage by this beetle. The IPS beetle is dormant for a short time during cold weather, usually January and February, the best time to remove pine trees, dead or alive.

Other removals would include invasive trees: The Bradford pear is #1 on the list of invasive plants. Schedule removal now since reliable tree companies are busy all year long. This is the concluding article for Trees in the Landscape: September, Plant Native Trees, October, Remove Invasive Trees.

#### **Edible Gardens & Conservation Committee**

The Edible Gardens Committee continues to 'dig and learn"!

Seven members visited the Craft Grown Farms storefront on Castle Street. We learned about hydroponic gardening from owner Randy Rhyne. He had us try samples of micro-greens that were blended to make complex flavors for kitchen dishes and cocktails. Randy sells his lettuce trays to many local restaurants and farmers' markets.

On November 1st, Our committee also joined the **Conservation Committee** going to the NHC Landfill, off Highway 421. Joe Suleyman, Environmental Management Director, narrated the tour. We should be so very proud of how technologically advanced and thoughtful our environment is in dealing with an ever-increasing problem of trash and efforts in recycling. We learned that 40% of food waste ends up in the Landfill and how they turn it into high-quality compost. Some parts of the area

have been filled with native plants and lakes with newly cleaned water that have been stocked with fish to catch.

As to the 'digging' part of our month, we continue to support the garden at Eden Village. All are invited to join us with your gardening gloves on the second Thursday of each month from 9-11 a.m.
