Gardening for Wildlife

It was with great enthusiasm that the Gardening for Wildlife committee gave the January General Meeting program!

Natalie Bohorquez was the guest speaker from the NC Wildlife Federation (NCWF). Natalie spoke to us about how much development had taken place in our state in the last few decades, and some of the statistics were alarming . . ., especially for native plants and wildlife. She gave us great information on what we can do as gardeners to protect and preserve our environment



with programs such as the "Butterfly Highway" and tips on certifying your yard for wildlife through the NCWF website.

Also in attendance and supporting the goal to have the City of Wilmington Wildlife certified by our Centennial in 2025 were Mayor Pro-tem Rev. Clifford Barnett and Salette Andrews from the Wilmington City Council. Our committee has found a friend in Ernie McLaney who was instrumental in working to have the City of Charlotte and the St. James Community certified, as he was also present at this meeting. Horticultural Minute

Trees Please! Oaks are the Most!





Oaks provide a host of offerings for wildlife. We are all familiar with the acorns produced over the summer and available for wildlife to eat in late summer and fall. But in the spring, oaks are the larval host plant for specific moths and butterflies.

Oaks support more life forms and interactions than any other tree genus in North America, sustaining everything from acorncollection woodpeckers to caterpillars that dazzle like jewels. Songbirds such as the Carolina Chickadee can be seen carrying a caterpillar to feed its nestlings.

Per Doug Tallamy, an entomologist at the University of Delaware, ninety-six percent of terrestrial birds rear their young on insects, and caterpillars are a particularly important food

source. In addition, he says that native trees support more of the caterpillars birds need to feed their young. During the breeding season, Carolina chickadees and other birds need many insects---in the case of chickadees, more than 5,000 per clutch of hatchlings!

Many species of oaks prosper in Wilmington. Along Market Street in the historic district are laurel oaks and seven live oaks in front of the Kenan House at 17th and Market. The UNCW

campus has more than a dozen species, including the magnificent promenade of Live Oaks at the front quadrangle.

Airlie Road has many Live Oaks with the characteristic wind-blown shape because they are near the water. The appreciation of these trees is so important.

A Post from Frances Parnell, Emeritus Member: "It isn't what we suggest for planting, but how we save what is already in place. Too many important trees, like our oaks and hollies, are needed for food, cover, and places to raise young and are removed to plant lawns and smaller plants. Once the larger and slow-growing vegetation is removed, it takes a long time to grow them again.





Bird Approved Seed Treats

February At-Home Activity

- Mix ½ cup unflavored gelatin with 1 ½ cups of hot water until clear and dissolved.
- Remove from heat and stir in 8 cups of birdseed, making sure all the seeds are coated.
- Shape the treats inside cookie cutters or in silicone mold. Pack tightly. If you use the silicone mold add the bird feed to the mold first and then fill with gelatin.
- Refrigerate for 2-4 hours and dry for 3 days.
- Before the treats are completely set, use a pencil to make a hole for the ribbon.
- When completely set, add ribbon or twine to hang in your trees.

Battery Island Bird Cruise

Sunday, May 19th, 2024

Join us for an educational and enjoyable cruise along the nine Lower Cape Fear River Islands, nesting sites of Brown Pelicans, White Ibis, Royal Terns, Great Egrets, American Oystercatchers, and other water birds on Sunday, May 19th. We will cruise on the Henrietta Riverboat docked at the River Walk in downtown Wilmington (at Dock Street) and travel to Battery Island across from Southport.

Lindsay Addison, Coastal Biologist for Audubon NC, will narrate the cruise. In



addition, Jill Peleuses of Wild Bird & Garden will be available onboard during our return trip to answer any songbird-related questions.

The Henrietta Riverboat features an air-conditioned lower level with tables and chairs and a canopy-covered upper deck with chairs. The riverboat is wheelchair accessible, restrooms are available, and the Henrietta crew provides a cash bar and snack bar. Boarding will begin at 10:30 am, departure at 11:00 am, and we will return approximately at 4-5 pm. Fun activities are planned during the return trip, including Bird Bingo!

Tickets are limited this year...and sell out quickly! Buy your ticket as soon as possible!

Tickets are \$100 each (check or cash), and your ticket price includes a deluxe box lunch from Jason's Deli. The Battery Island Committee will have tickets for sale at the March General Meeting and the Wild Bird & Garden Store in Hanover Center beginning **March 15**.
