My dad is doing well but is experiencing some paralysis in his left leg. He is receiving therapy four times a week, and he gives me my marching orders daily, ha!

I want to share the best story of scattering some kindness and commitment. You all know I committed to be an educator years ago when I decided to become a teacher. I got to serve in many different capacities throughout my career. My dad joined the Navy after school, and upon his return home, he went to work for the same company as his father and uncles as a crane operator in construction.

Two years ago, we attended a ceremony with him where he was given a gold watch and a 75-year pin as a member of the Operators Local 965 out of Springfield. He was committed to his job but loved

He was supposed to sell them.....and you guessed it......this never happened.

So, here I am faced with dealing with life and how to get his new car in the garage with his lifelong collection of tools, right where the car should be.

I convinced my dad that he could benefit the youth in my hometown by donating those tools and equipment to the shop's vocational education program at my high school. Amazingly, he agreed and told me to get out there to that high school and talk to someone.

This past Tuesday, I did just that, and on Thursday, the principal, five students, and the head of maintenance for the school district pulled into the driveway. What took my dad 72 years to collect only took those students 42 minutes to load on the flat trailer.

With smiles on all their faces, the lifelong gathering of tools was about to be scattered in the shop area of my former high school, so I hugged those kids and told them, "Merry Christmas!"

I took my dad a strawberry milkshake from the Dairy Queen and visited him at the facility. He was so proud of this accomplishment, and those tools will live on in the lives of the young students.

The below motion was approved by the membership at the November General Membership Meeting.

MOTION

The Membership Committee and the Battery Island Committee make a motion to invite Jill Peleuses, owner of the Wild Bird and Garden Store at Hanover Center, and Lindsay Addison, Coastal Biologist with the AUDUBON North Carolina, to become Honorary Members of the CFGC for their outstanding service to the Cape Fear Garden Club, Inc.

The rational: Both Jill Peleuses and Lindsay Addison fulfill objectives of the garden club by providing non-profit, philanthropic and educational opportunities for our members and the public. They encourage environmental improvement through protection and conservation of native trees, plants and birds. Tickets for the Battery Island cruises, and the Azalea Garden Tour are available for purchase at the Wild Bird and Garden Store.

The below motion was approved by the membership at the November General Membership Meeting.

MOTION

The By-Law Review Committee and Azalea Garden Tour Committee move that the position of the Azalea Garden Tour Treasurer should become an officer of the Club.

The below By-Laws Amendment Proposal was read for the first time and will be read again at the January Meeting and voted on by the General Membership.

BY-LAWS AMENDMENT PROPOSALS Article IV – Officers. Page 60. Section 1

The officers of The Cape Fear Garden Club, Inc. shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Third Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, and Assistant Treasurer.

Change: The officers of The Cape Fear Garden Club, Inc. shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Third Vice President, Corresponding Secretary, Recording Secretary, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, and Azalea Garden Tour Treasurer.

Azalea Garden Tour Treasurer is added as a Club officer. The below changes in both By-Laws and Policies and Procedures are due to the above change.

Section 2

All Officers shall be elected at the February meeting for a term of one year. No officer shall be eligible to hold the same office for more than one term except the Treasurer and Assistant Treasurer. Change: The slate of officers shall be presented at the February meeting for a term of one year and voted on at the March meeting. No officer shall be eligible to hold the same office for more than one term except the Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, and Azalea Garden Tour Treasurer.

Horticultural Minute

"Blue Tree" for the Blue Room At the White House

For the 15th year, a Fraser fir from North Carolina is the official tree for The White House. In October, White House officials selected a 19-foot tree. It was shipped to Washington, D.C, on Nov. 15. The tree stands from floor to ceiling, filling the Blue Room, and the room's chandelier is removed to accommodate the tree's full height.

The combination of form, needle retention, dark blue-green color, pleasant scent, and excellent shipping characteristics has led to Fraser fir being one of the most popular Christmas tree species. It has been used as the official Christmas tree for the White House more than any other species.

A potential Blue Room tree, which can take up to 24 years to grow, must have a diameter of nearly 12 feet to be the center of the room. Proportions are important. The tree can't be too wide or too narrow. It must be very symmetrical and very full. It needs sturdy ornament-ready branches, and in the Blue Room, it must be strong enough to hold up to 3,000 ornaments and strands of lights, which get their power from the chandelier's power source in the ceiling. Hundreds of gallons of water keep the tree fresh and exude the scent of Christmas.

The Fraser fir grows naturally only at elevations above 4,500 feet in the Southern Appalachian Mountains. Its highest native habitat is Mt. Mitchell, NC (6,684 feet), the highest U.S. point east of the Mississippi. The tree was named for the Scottish botanist John Fraser (1750-1811). North Carolina produces most Fraser fir Christmas trees sold commercially since the late 1940s.

Again, in 2024, the $16^{\mbox{th}}$ Tar Heel tree will be honored as the Official White House Christmas Tree.
